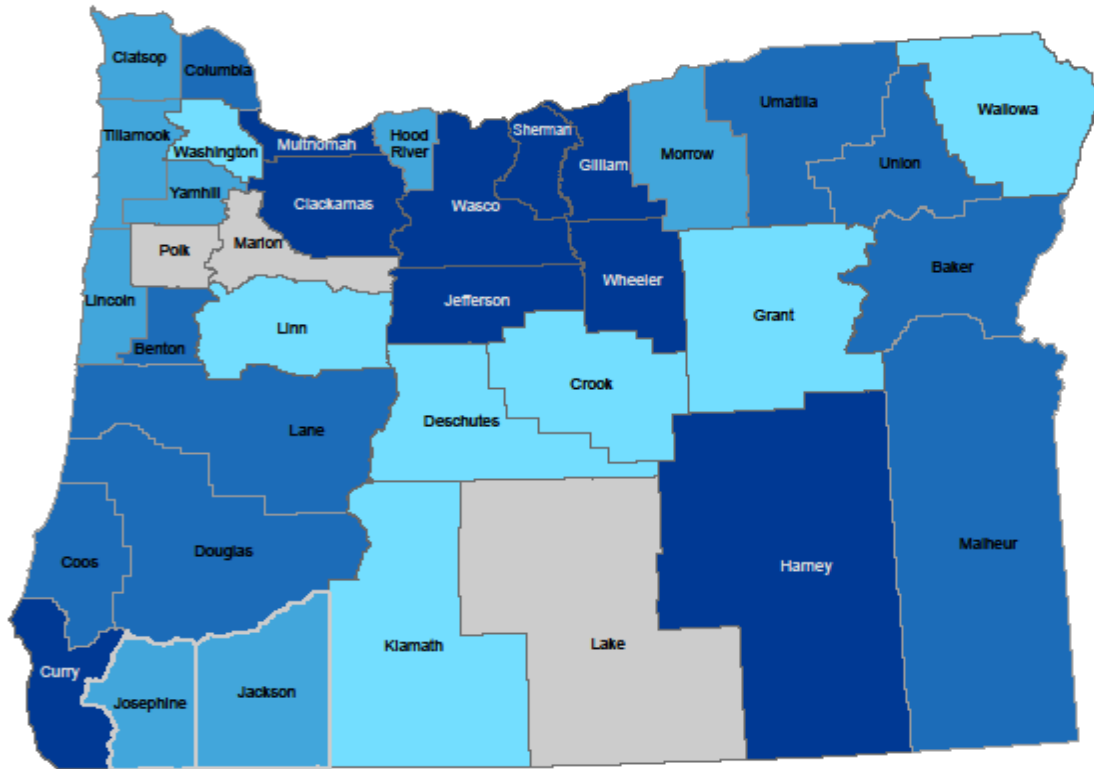

Priority Population: Latinx
