Kelly Soter: Phoenix-Talent School District (listen for new title) – Resilience of families after the fire. A lot of our family have returned, but have several hundred families who are still displaced or are in transitional housing. Housing continues to be a real struggle for our families.

Younghee Kim: Coordinator for the Early Learning Program at SOU: We started classes on September 21st. We are looking to maximize what we do well and see what might be dated. Student enrollment has been low. High school population is dropping which reflects at both SOU and RCC. Which program might change will be determined later in the year. RCC's enrollments are up. Since California requires bachelor degrees, we are getting a lot more Northern California students in early learning.

Selection of next book study title

Last year we studied John Crown Apple's book. Belonging through a culture of Dignity. Just about to launch our first "What are we going to do about it." At the end of the book, there is a Climate survey for the early learning workforce. To find out the concepts in the book. How is the Southern Oregon workforce doing? How are we doing to create a climate where people want to be in. If they are comfortable, they are more likely to stay. Once we have a base line, this group, along with the workforce committee, we can identify some needs. Then every two years do another survey, to hopefully see over time those needs narrow. Then we'll begin to

survey the parents of the children who are served on the same topics. To make some meaningful steps from what we learned.

- Presentation to Director's Group November or December 2022
- Launch survey to all early learning centers in region January 2023. Baseline data.
- Bring results to Equity Committee and Director's Group February 2023
 - Review results and create action plan for support to child care centers

September 2023 – repeat survey. Compare to baseline data. Adjust strategies MORE

Is there any value to look at their qualifications in this survey? Add a question or two, demographics, what qualifications are out there?

We did a survey in 2019 that did include this information. Maybe look at that survey and pair up that new survey. Might be most helpful for our Workforce committee.

Rene: I will dust off that survey and see how we can blend the two together without it getting to large.

Asked if anyone if anyone wanted to comment about the staff survey sent out by SOESD last year. Kelly said that they had some good results from it. The survey was all staff, not by building so it wasn't as easy to look at improvements by building, staff

Might have value to ask for city.

If we ask questions about wages or benefits, do so at the end so not to affect their lens of questions. Not about getting paid, but about their actual inclusion. Not to change their perspective. Not have one question to change their perspective.

New book to go through together for this year:

O How to be an antiracist by Ibram X. Kendi

 The Conversation: How Seeking and Speaking the Truth about Racism Can Radically Transform Individuals and by Dr. Robert Livingston

82% of the attendees selected The Conversation for this year.

Younghee: I learned a lot from both video clips. Can we watch more of the video clips and discuss them. RB: Good idea, to hear from the authors in their own voice. TS: part of my work is also student internships programs. Those high school students go into those paid internship programs with providers. The goal is that they would be work ready or go into RCC or SOU when they exit the program. We have sites ready for more students. Schedules are our biggest hurdles. Is there any way to work with schools to allow these students to go into the program during the day?
