

SOESD district liaisons have been actively connecting with component districts, and so far, 89% of districts have responded. These conversations are helping us streamline support, understand district needs, share resources, and support local priorities.

6. Southern Oregon Success Update: *All Together Now*


Southern Oregon Success is part of a collaboration that brought University of California, Berkeley Professor john a. powell, an internationally recognized expert on bridging across differences and bringing communities together, to Ashland on October 6.

Professor powell (he does not capitalize his name) spoke to a crowd of almost 600 people in the Bowmer Theatre at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival about the critical role of belonging, particularly during this time of social fragmentation and isolation.

He contrasted “breaking stories” which establish outsiders or “others” who are seen as threats to the social order to “bridging stories” which acknowledge that those with opposing viewpoints can share common interests. Professor powell emphasized the importance of belonging, which involves individuals or communities co-creating what they want rather than inclusion, which occurs when one group has created an environment and others are invited in.

The talk concluded with a panel discussion provided by SOU President Rick Baily, United Way Executive Director Dee Anne Everson, Black Southern Oregon Alliance Board member D.L. Richardson, and Lomakatski Restoration Project Executive Director Marko Bey.

This talk was the launch of All Together Now, a multi-year, multi-generational, multi-cultural collaborative to strengthen communities in our region. The first year will focus on Ashland and in the second year, the collaborative will branch out into Phoenix and Talent.
